Dear Speaker Johnson, Majority Leader Thune, Leader Jeffries, and Leader Schumer:

On behalf of the undersigned 115 organizations representing employers, education and training providers, workforce boards, community based organizations, workers and student and other organizations invested in ensuring a strong workforce system where workers can access training and employers can hire workers with the skills they need, we urge you to ensure that reconciliation legislation protects key energy investments, preserves access to essential federal support programs without new work requirements, and expands tax opportunities for workers and employers that support access to skills training.

While the economy remains strong, recent data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics shows unemployment slowly rising while job openings decline. In March, the number of individuals unemployed, underemployed, or not in the labor force but who want a job was nearly 18 million—more than double the number of job openings. This imbalance underscores the urgent need for greater workforce investments that allow workers to access good jobs, as well as the maintenance and expansion of investments that will spur job creation.

This concern looms large for workers, and voters overwhelmingly support providing skills training for those displaced by automation and Al. Indeed, more than two-thirds of voters believe that Al is a serious or very serious challenge currently faced by American workers, and 85% of voters support a policy that provides skills retraining at no cost to any worker who loses their job due to automation or artificial intelligence.

Without robust federal investment in workforce training and supportive services, millions of workers may struggle to access family-sustaining jobs, while employers face persistent shortages of workers with the skills they require ultimately hindering economic growth. Public investments in skills enjoy further strong bipartisan support. In fact, 82% of voters support increasing government funding for skills training, including 91% of Democrats, 74% of Republicans, and 83% of Independents.

As Congress considers reconciliation legislation, it is critical that any proposal protects and expands programs that help workers build in-demand skills and access economic opportunity and help businesses grow and thrive. Specifically, Congress should:

 Protect energy and infrastructure investments by ensuring the full and efficient deployment of federal funding in clean energy, broadband, and infrastructure projects.
 These investments are expected to support 3 million jobs annually across construction, manufacturing, and energy sectors—many of which pay above the national average and are accessible to workers without college degrees. Rolling back funds risks delaying projects, wasting taxpayer dollars, and causing job losses. Already, workforce training programs linked to these investments are being paused due to funding uncertainty, leaving employers without the skilled workers they need and denying communities the dual benefits of job opportunities and economic development.

- Modernize the Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC) by providing businesses with the
 maximum credit for hiring and supporting eligible workers through work-based learning
 programs, such as apprenticeships and on-the-job training. This reform would ensure
 that WOTC not only connects people to jobs, but to career pathways with long-term
 potential which helps businesses address skills gaps while creating better economic
 outcomes.
- Preserve access to essential supports by maintaining eligibility for programs such as
 Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and Temporary
 Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Evidence consistently shows that mandatory
 work requirements do not lead to long-term employment stability or higher wages, and
 they fail to reduce long-term reliance on public assistance.
- Expand Pell Grant eligibility to include students enrolled in short-term, high-quality
 training programs. Doing so will enable more people to access the skills they need while
 also helping employers find qualified workers more quickly. Expanding access to Pell
 should not come at the expense of students pursuing other forms of postsecondary
 education; rather, it should ensure that all learners can access the federal support they
 need to advance their careers.
- Strengthen tax credits that support working families, including expanding the Child Tax Credit (CTC) and the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). These credits can help low-wage workers cover basic expenses while pursuing training and transitioning into better jobs.

Congress has a clear opportunity to build a stronger, more inclusive workforce by maintaining and enhancing investments in programs that create jobs, expand access to training, and provide the supports necessary for success. These investments are effective, fiscally responsible, and essential to our nation's continued economic growth.

We thank you for your leadership and urge you to protect and expand these critical programs through the reconciliation process.
